

# Introduction

How being a parent makes one pray—through the years! Our adult children need our prayers. As we parents long to encourage and help them, prayer is no last resort. Our prayers are perhaps the most important way to help our children as they move on in life. Our prayers focus our own hearts before God, and they lift up our children to the heavenly Father who hears us, and who answers according to his perfect will. How amazing to think that Christian parents can keep reaching out in prayer to God our Father, who has shown his love to us in his own Son—and who gives us his Holy Spirit to help us pray, according to his Word.

These prayers have grown from my heart through years of praying for three sons—and now for their growing families. I know that you parents (and grandparents, and aunts and uncles, and spiritual mothers and fathers!) will surely pray for your children in your own words and with your own specific praises and petitions. My hope is that these prayers might mingle profitably with yours, as we all lift up the next generations to the Lord who knows and loves them perfectly.

These prayers grow out of the Scriptures; each is printed

with a brief related Bible passage and reflects that passage in its content. What confidence, that when we don't know how to pray for our children, the Spirit and the Word guide and help us. Just as the Scriptures show us Jesus Christ at the very center, so these prayers aim to focus on Jesus—his love, his work of salvation on our behalf, his glory, his blessed rule in every area of our lives, his coming again.

The prayers apply to sons and daughters both; they alternate, but any of them can easily be changed by switching the pronouns appropriately. Please note: the prayers are written in one parent's voice, although they can certainly be prayed by parents together. Parents, please know that these prayers, as they focus on our children, inevitably focus often on us parents too. Prayer stretches our hearts in all kinds of ways.

There's nothing like having adult children to help make clear just how quickly life moves on, generation after generation. It is humbling and good to watch the next generation take their places. It makes us pray indeed.

May we wrap these prayers all around with worship to the Lord who rules history and watches over his people forever. The world changes, and we change, but God's redemptive love in Jesus Christ his Son does not change: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13:8).

# Of Worship and Trust

I look up to you, O Lord of all, and see your everlasting greatness, bow before your heavenly throne. As I bow low, I see our fleetingness, our human days that sprout like grass, and grow, and then are gone.

I thank you that your steadfast love will never cease, but is from everlasting past to everlasting future on the ones who fear you; and your righteousness will not run out, but extends farther than we can see—to children's children.

I humbly pray, O Father God, that you would spread your love to generations, in and through my child, displaying your great gift of righteousness in this next human life, and then another, all passed on by your redeeming grace, received by faith in your redeeming Son, as your regenerating Spirit brings new life.

Through generation after generation, may praise keep on rising to your throne, until the Day when all of us will gather round it, shining like the Son, and never parting, never ceasing praise and worship to you, glorious Lord.

But we are not of those who shrink back and are destroyed, but of those who have faith and preserve their souls.

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. For by it the people of old received their commendation. By faith we understand that the universe was created by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things that are visible. (Heb. 10:39–11:3)

The book of Hebrews gives us a picture of God's people through the ages pressing forward in faith, believing God's Word. In Old Testament times, God gave promises of things yet to come, and his faithful people lived in the assurance of things hoped for: they trusted his Word.

The fulfillment of all God's promises bursts into sight with the coming of Jesus, his death on the cross, and his resurrection from the grave. We believers continue to live now in faith, looking back to the cross and the empty tomb, looking up to the glorified Christ in heaven, and looking forward to his promised coming again.

Let's pray that our children would be of those who press forward in faith, by God's grace, believing God's Word and assured of the hope of Christ's glorious return.

# For Faith

May my child walk on in faith, with eyesight ever clearer for the things not seen—invisible realities that draw believers forward with a hope that only grows with passing years.

Lord Jesus, may he see you as just through a doorway—
Lamb of God who died, now risen, glorious, interceding there at God's right hand for the ones who are your own by faith, the gift of your amazing grace.

May those around him sense not fading dreams or shrinking spirit; may he ever more clearly grow in strength of soul, whether his body is weak or strong. May he exude conviction of those things not seen, so others are convicted, too, to look, and see.

When doubts arise, or doubters challenge, may he turn always to your powerful Word.

By your word, Lord God, the universe was made—
the seen made out of unseen, from the start.

Please let him trust your Word so mercifully revealed, so fully shown to us in Christ your Son, our Savior.

Please let your Word sustain and grow his faith, through every moment on the way to full and perfect sight.

May he walk on through life in faith, with eyesight ever clearer for the things he's yet to see.

These are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name. (John 20:31)

You may know very personally the pain of watching a child wander, without faith in Christ. We ache for these children.

And we pray. Even as our hearts ache, we pray. For these wanderers we pray—and nothing makes us pray more, often persisting through years of petition, not knowing the answer to our prayers.

As we pray, we come to grasp the comfort and the power of prayer to the Lord who sees into every heart. In these prayers, we learn to rest in what we know—or *whom* we know, the sovereign and loving Lord of all.

# For a Wanderer

Lord God, I do not know and cannot see her heart, but all her steps appear to turn away from you, away from light and life found in your Son.

I know, Lord, that you see into the darkest heart; your perfect wisdom lays out all our paths. Please turn her feet and move her heart toward you, toward life in Christ, I pray.

I do not know just how you might ordain to call her to yourself to find eternal life and life abundant, through believing in your Son.

I know that you have given your breathed-out Word, the writings that can make us wise for salvation as we believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, the living Word made flesh to save us. Please, by your Spirit and your people, speak your Word of life into her heart, I pray.

I do not know the ways in which her story will unfold, or how your perfect purposes will guide her path.

I know with thankful heart that you have sent your Son to give us life. I know you, Lord, and live in you. I trust in you, even as I daily ask, please lead her to believe in Christ your Son, I pray. Teach me, O LORD, the way of your statutes; and I will keep it to the end. Give me understanding, that I may keep your law and observe it with my whole heart. (Ps. 119:33–34)

In most cases, words of parents to grown children are far fewer than they were to growing children. We don't speak to and with them quite as much—but we speak to the Lord about them just as much!

And we ask God continually that it would be his voice, his Word, to which our grown children would be listening. The inspired Scriptures are God's own breath to us humans; we need his breathed-out Word to live on by faith. Our children need this Word.

We can't always talk about this with our children, especially adult ones. But we can trust God's Word, pray according to it, and pray that our children would *keep* it, as the psalmist prays, now and to the end.
